How to find moose at

Baxter State Park, Maine

I went to Maine last year from June 14 to 20 in order to photograph moose. The weather was not the greatest, but the trip was very worthwhile.

I saw a lot of moose and some calves with moose cows. I think if I had waited another week the calves would have been more visible. On the other hand, Vinnie Kempf went a week later and saw very few moose—instead, more loons.

River Pond

Basing myself in the outskirts of Millinocket, which is just off I95 in Maine, I saw most of my moose along Golden Road, which is less than a quarter mile north from where I was staying at the Big Moose Inn.

As you head north toward Baxter from the inn, Golden Road is a left fork that leads, first, to River Pond. A few times, I saw as many as seven moose at once at this pond. The problem for photographers at River Pond is that the pond is big, and the moose are in the middle of the pond where there is an island. To find the back of the island, you need



to travel north on Golden Road until you see a sign on the left saying "Hiker's Classroom." The sign is before the pond. Turn onto this dirt road and you will reach a sign with a map of the area. After reading the map drive further on the road to the end. Follow the markers on the trail to "Site #5". Here you will have a good view of the back of the island. For me, it was a good spot, for I found a cow with its calf. You must bring your 600mm, bug spray, and netting. I was told that this same cow is there every spring.

Another good spot to look for moose on Golden Road is the "Salad Bar." This is a mud hole that is filled with salty peat. It is located on the left side traveling north at the end of the telephone lines.

Compass Pond is another pond on the right side of Golden Road traveling north. The light here is very nice in the afternoon. The setting sun will be on your back. I saw moose here only once, however.

Before you cross the bridge on Golden Road there is a campground called Abol Campgrounds. In the back, there is a pond where I saw a cow with twins. You can't drive into the camp; it is private. There is, however, a way to drive back there. Traveling south on the Golden Road from the camp make a left at the fork. The sign will say "Road Closed," but you will not drive far before you see a turnoff on the right with a sign for the Appalachian Trail (AT). Turn in here, drive in a little way and park, and then walk to the bridge and the pond.

After photographing on Golden Road, look for the short cut that leads to Baxter State Park. This road is a dirt road on the right side when traveling north on Golden Road—marked by a red ribbon tied to a tree. At this point, you are 4.9 miles from the Big Moose Inn. The dirt road will take you back to the main road that leads to Baxter.

Inside Baxter

I didn't see many moose inside Baxter. Traveling north from the "South Gate," turn left on Park Tote Road to get to Stump Pond. Here I saw some moose but no calves. The light here is coming towards you and a little from the right in the late afternoon.

This is a good stop, however, to see a beaver. His dam is to the left.

Keep driving on this road and look to the sides for lady slippers, another good photographic subject. When you come to the AT, you can walk in to Tracy, Elbow and Daicey Ponds. This is another spot to look for lady slippers.

On your walk, be sure to stop at the first pond, Tracy. From the bridge you can take a picture of Mount Katahdin. This is a nice landscape with the pond in the foreground and the mountain behind. In June there was still snow on the mountain. Stay on the AT, and look in on Elbow Pond. Continue on to the fork in the trail and make a left. This will be the "Daicey Trail Loop." At this pond I heard loons but did not see them. There are canoes here but you have to get the key for the locks at Daicey Pond Campgrounds before you walk in.

Now, walk back on the AT to your car. Driving further on Park Tote Road, you will see on the left a part of Elbow Pond. Here I saw bulls up close. Keep driving until you see a road on the left. This road will bring you to the Daicey Pond Campgrounds. Continue on the road and the next left will be the turn off to Kidney Pond. Here you can get a canoe. This is where I got some good pictures of a bull in the water. Kidney is also a good spot to see loons. Another place you may like is Ledge Falls. To get there, continue driving on the main dirt road, Park Tote Road, for about 20 minutes

To get back to the "South Gate," make a U turn on Park Tote Road. When you get back to the gate, a right turn at the fork will take you back to Millinocket, while a left turn at the fork will take you onto Brook Road to Sandy Stream Pond. The one time here that I did see a moose, I was at "Big Rock"—and I needed a 600mm.

Lodging. I stayed at "The Big Moose Inn" www.bigmoosecabins.com outside downtown Millinocket. The phone is (207) 723-8391. The inn is open from May to the middle of October.

Next to the lodge there is a store with a Verizon pay phone if you don't carry a cell. This is the only phone around; there are no phones in the inn rooms. Here you can get snacks and cold drinks and coffee. It would be a good idea to buy a map here. The one I recommend is DeLorme's Map & Guide of Baxter State Park and Katahdin.

Eating. The Big Moose Inn restaurant is open on Fridays and Saturdays. Make reservations. The first Saturdays of the month they have live music. Back in downtown Millinocket, the Hotel Inn also has a good restaurant. I liked the Lobster Newberg and steamers—this is Maine, after all. The River Outfitters Restaurant is also very good. Here I ate Fettuccine Alfredo with Seafood. The Green Mountain Coffee Shoppe makes good coffee, cakes, and sandwiches. The AT Dinner makes good pancakes. Scooter's is a place for hamburgers and ribs.

Directions. To get to Maine, I take the Garden State Parkway North to the N.Y. Thruway North to I84 East. This way you avoid the George Washington and the Tappan Zee. I84 takes you through Conn. to the Mass Turnpike (I90). Go east toward Boston for a dozen or so miles, then take I495 North past Lowell, Lawrence, and Haverhill to I95 North. Follow I95 through New Hampshire and then through most of Maine, until you reach Medway, where there is a turn-off for Millinocket.

Driving time is around 10 1/2 hours, about 575 miles.




Peter's pick of the month
