Jerry's Tech Tips

Better color corrections

Choosing Image> Adjustments> Auto Color automatically color-corrects your image. For better results, however, choose Image>

Adjustments> Curves.

click the Options button, and use the following settings: Find Dark & Light Colors, Snap Neutral Midtones, Shadow Clip .05, and Highlight Clip .05. Then turn on the Save as defaults checkbox and click OK. The next time you use Auto Color, you should get better results.

After arriving there, 1200 miles from home, we noticed that our vehicle had developed some serious front end problems.



After leaving Michigan, we visited California's Mount Lassen Volcanic National Park, an area not well known outside of California. There, we found beautiful mountain scenes, and a thermal area similar to, but in some respects prettier than those in Yellowstone.









Our 24th – A Dual Projection International

Ridgewood Camera Club took immediate action to take advantage of the option of going Dual Projection. This meant we would receive digital as well as slide film entries to our International.

The response to our International from photographers domestic and foreign provided us a slightly higher total entry than last year. The first increase in years.

The purpose of an International is to provide an exhibition of its top scoring slides. This to energize you in to doing more in your photographic hobby. For the entrants into an International, the goal is to get acceptances. 30 to 35 percent of the entrants earn acceptances.

To reach the one star level, you need 30 acceptances using, at least, six titles. To get to two star, requires 80 acceptances using, at least, 16 titles. The three star level is reached when one has 160 acceptances with, at least, 36 titles. The four star level is reached when one has 320 acceptances with at, least 64 titles. Five star requires 640 acceptances with, at least, 128 titles. Marie is five star in this division, I am four star. Marie is also 4 star in Nature. Marjorie Forrest in now going for her second Galaxy. That is a whole new ball game. All previous titles no longer count. Marjorie has stars in other divisions, too.

What is It?

The Nature Division recommends exhibitors use descriptive titles on images they submit to International Nature Exhibitions. Cute or incorrect titles can actually hurt an image's score when titles are read during judging, a common practice for Nature Exhibitions. Outside of exhibitions, the Nature Division encourages nature photographers to know about their subjects to help them take strong storytelling images of these subjects instead of just "Here I Am" shots. Guide books are not always sufficient for this.

The Nature Division Identification Service helps PSA members who submit their Work on Nature Subjects to be correctly identified. Images submitted for identification may be slides or electronic, with electronic images preferred. If the subject of a slide cannot be immediately identified, it will be scanned and the original image returned to the member so it will not be tied up or possibly lost. Images definitely do not have to be competition quality but they should be sharp enough to reveal details necessary to distinguish one species from another. A series of images of the same subject from different angles or that include habitat and potential food sources provide the service even more clues. Please indicate the location and the time of year that the image was taken when submitting images. Note that location and time for images taken at a zoo is not very helpful. Under those circumstances it is best to go to the Zoo Staff for help in identifying your subject. Please contact Daniel Charbonnet, ddrc3@msn.com. to find out how to submit images for identification and to find out what additional information is required to accompany the image.
